Pastor's Corner

This week, I was supposed to be on a pilgrimage with 40 other St. James parishioners to visit Europe with the highlight of the trip being the Passion Play in Oberammergau, Germany. Ironically, the play has been performed every 10 years since 1634 in thanksgiving to God for being spared from a bubonic plague outbreak.

The major plague outbreak was in the 14th century and was the cause of the Black Death that swept through Asia, Europe, and Africa and killed an estimated 50 million people. It killed about 40% of the European population.

An outbreak of bubonic plague devastated Bavaria during the Thirty Years' War (1618–1648). The village of Oberammergau remained plague-free until 1633, when in 33 days, 81 villagers would die, half of Oberammergau's population. The villagers vowed that if God spared them from the plague, they would perform a play every 10 years depicting the life and death of Jesus. Nobody died of plague in Oberammergau after that vow, and the villagers kept their word to God by performing the passion play for the first time in 1634.

So, here we are, not in Oberammergau and the plague of 1633, but hunkered down in our own homes, cautiously going outside only with masks and social distancing, in the midst of our own plague. In the last 6 months, nearly 1 million people have died from COVID-19 worldwide.

The effects of the pandemic go far beyond the loss of loved ones as so many have lost jobs or homes and the societal shutdown has affected nearly every part of our lives. Our world has become disoriented. In these times it is easy to become depressed, anxious, angry or just plain confused.

We should not simply be victims, helplessly locked away. Even as we stay safe, **we are people of faith.** We are made strong in the midst of adversity because of this faith and our relationship with God who continues to call us to know we are loved and created for so much more. **We are people of hope**. We know that God's plan is so much greater than we can even imagine and that we will have the strength and resolve to deal with whatever happens in our lives. **We are people of love.** We are made whole when our hearts stay connected with God and with one another. In reaching out to others with love we become a lifeline to them, helping them to find stability with God as their foundation.

Don't want to be a victim? Take massive action and stay connected:

Reach out to your friends and families . A phone call, text message or through social media. You might be their only human contact. Find out if they need anything

from the store.

- Get involved with an online bible study. We offer 'The Bible and the Virgin Mary' every Tuesday night. -Join us online for Mass or come to O'Gorman Center for

Sunday or the courtyard for Daily Mass.

- Pray the rosary to end the pandemic—Join with fellow parishioners in the Medjugorje Prayer Group.

- Shop and deliver food or supplies to those you called who are homebound.

-Knit baby caps (beanies) or blankets for expectant mothers with an unexpected pregnancy.

- Fast from secular TV programs and tune in to EWTN and learn more about your faith.

- Tune a radio to Relevant radio AM 930

Stay attentive to the needs of people around you. These small acts of kindness are truly expressions of love. As St. Paul reminds us.

"So faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love." (1 Cor. 13:13)

Sunday School

Would you like your children to learn about God's love for them? Would you like them to be familiar with favorite Old and New Testament bible stories? In the event we are able to offer traditional classes during mass at some point during the year, families will be given the option to attend in person or continue to receive lessons virtually.

Gospel Meditation

Do you ever wonder why things never seem to come together?

We see glimpses of consistency, equity, justice, peace, harmony, and wellbeing, but it always falls short. Human life is still expendable and manipulated, people are used for personal advancement, countries are at war, the economy continues to face turbulence, anger and frustration are widespread, and happiness is the possession of just a few and not the many. Could it be that we are serving the wrong kingdom? We keep trying to make our kingdom work and find ourselves still scratching our heads after repeatedly failed attempts to do so. It is almost as if people are saying, "we'll get it right this time if we do ...," as if some new and secret innovation has yet to be tried.

We serve God's kingdom. We may not like hearing that, but it is true. God did not make only a few of us. God made all of humanity and all of humanity is called into service. How often do we defer any of our decision making to God? Secular leaders enjoy winking at the Sacred Scriptures and using them when they advance a cause, but are they really listened to? Even those who consider themselves believers tend to sift through God's Word, taking what seems to fit and apply and discarding the rest. After all, if we were really serving God's kingdom, we would see an abundance of fruit testifying to this fact. But what's growing on the vine is anything other than good Gospel-centered fruit.

Nothing in this world or the next belongs to us. We have such a hard time believing this and live our lives as if everything belongs to us. And, the fruit does not lie. Trees that are neglected and not properly fertilized reveal that fact. They cannot keep these deep secrets from being discovered. If God's kingdom was really being served, then life would have looked much differently after the crucifixion. By now, there would be plenty of fantastic fruit to harvest in abundance: faith, hope, love, prudence, temperance, justice, and fortitude. Do we see these in abundance around us? Why not?

Still we grapple with ownership, privilege, status, and the protection of our rights. It's all about us and what we want, think we need, and expect to acquire. When did this change of focus occur? We may be struggling with this since humanity's day in the garden and have never understood that the focus cannot be on us and the apple but on God and God's justice. Maybe the only answer is that the Kingdom be taken from us and given to someone who is willing to do a better job.

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Catholic Q and A

Q: Shakespeare, who knew something about human nature, wrote about the power and the value of hope in somewhat raw, rustic tones: "The miserable have no other medicine, but only hope."

Monsignor Mike, who also knows about the nature of things human and divine, wrote with distilled, succinctly uplifting pastoral rhetoric, rooted in faith and scripture: "We are a people of hope."

What does the catechism, the "map for our spiritual journey toward transformation", say about hope? A: The catechism discusses the nature of hope as part of the essence of the first commandment, placing the value of hope as a source of prayer and as a theological virtue, stating that,"...virtues like hope are the foundation of Christian moral activity."

We are directed to, and enlightened by scripture:

Proverbs 10, "The hope of the righteous brings joy." In Ephesians 1, "May the father of our lord Jesus Christ enlighten the eyes of our hearts, that we may know what is the hope that belongs to his call."

The Saint James Choir calls us, in a Janet Whitaker song, "In Every Age" : "Teach us to be patient even as we wait. In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge; you have been our hope..."

A people of faith, a people of love, praying for and appreciative of that measure of ultimate joy. We look ahead with that faithful, clearer perspective of the enlightened, "eyes of our hearts."

That's good medicine.


