Obviously, this is not the ideal way to celebrate Mass, but staying in touch with the Scriptures, the Eucharist and the Community is vitally important to keeping our lives balanced and focused on the important realities of our lives.

We are all frustrated by the prospect of not being able to gather for prayer as we want, but we also realize that every time we gather together we are putting the lives of our brothers and sisters at risk and so we choose to stay as safe as possible for a short while knowing that we have done so for the good of us all. Signing a release waiver might sound like a good idea so we can attend Mass together, but not at the cost of maybe celebrating your funeral-or you celebrating my funeral.

Advent is a time of longing—longing for God to touch our world with His saving grace because the world cannot answer our deepest needs. It is Christ Jesus who made that a reality and we continue to find hope and healing in the gift of His life and the power of the Gospel He proclaimed for us. In Him we are able to look beyond the limitations of the world and our lives and find peace, hope and love in the new life he calls us to share with him.

May your hearts be open to the promise of new life in this Advent season.

THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE & RECONCILIATION

1422 "Those who approach the sacrament of Penance obtain pardon from God's mercy for the offense committed against him, and are, at the same time, reconciled with the Church which they have wounded by their sins and which by charity, by example, and by prayer labors for their conversion.

I. What is This Sacrament Called?

1423 It is called the sacrament of conversion because it makes sacramentally present Jesus' call to conversion, the first step in returning to the Father from whom one has strayed by sin.

It is called the sacrament of Penance, since it consecrates the Christian sinner's personal and ecclesial

steps of conversion, penance, and satisfaction.

1424 It is called the sacrament of confession, since the disclosure or confession of sins to a priest is an essential element of this sacrament. In a profound sense it is also a "confession" - acknowledgment and praise - of the holiness of God and of his mercy toward sinful man.

It is called the sacrament of forgiveness, since by the priest's sacramental absolution God grants the penitent "pardon and peace."

It is called the sacrament of Reconciliation, because it imparts to the sinner the live of God who reconciles: "Be reconciled to God." He who lives by God's merciful love is ready to respond to the Lord's call: "Go; first be reconciled to your brother."

VI. The Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation

1440 Sin is before all else an offense against God, a rupture of communion with him. At the same time it damages communion with the Church. For this reason conversion entails both God's forgiveness and reconciliation with the Church, which are expressed and accomplished liturgically by the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation.

Only God forgives sin

1441 Only God forgives sins. Since he is the Son of God, Jesus says of himself, "The Son of man has authority on earth to forgive sins" and exercises this divine power: "Your sins are forgiven." Further, by virtue of his divine authority he gives this power to men to exercise in his name.

1442 Christ has willed that in her prayer and life and action his whole Church should be the sign and instrument of the forgiveness and reconciliation that he acquired for us at the price of his blood. But he entrusted the exercise of the power of absolution to the apostolic ministry which he charged with the "ministry of reconciliation." The apostle is sent out "on behalf of Christ" with "God making his appeal" through him and pleading: "Be reconciled to God."

Reconciliation with the Church

1443 During his public life Jesus not only forgave sins, but also made plain the effect of this forgiveness: he reintegrated forgiven sinners into the community of the People of God from which sin had alienated or even excluded them. A remarkable sign of this is the fact that Jesus receives sinners at his table, a gesture that expresses in an astonishing way both God's forgiveness and the return to the bosom of the People of God.

Gospel Meditation

You are at the eye doctor and it's time for the peripheral vision test.

You know the one. It's where you put your head up to a contraption and have to click a switch every time you see a squiggly line. If you don't concentrate and maintain optimal focus, you will miss them and skew the outcome of the test. You can easily find yourself with a diagnosis that really isn't accurate! Concentration and focus are key to succeeding with this evaluation. They are also key to developing a healthy, vibrant spiritual life. If we do not bring our full consciousness to the task, concentrate with all our might, be watchful and vigilant, we are not going to see God's loving presence flashing before our eyes!

That's why we need Advent. Let's face it. We can easily get distracted, focus on nonessential and superficial things and lose touch with what really matters. Our attentions wander. We daydream and even become a bit overwhelmed and tired. All of the stresses and demands of life consume us and we find ourselves constantly trying to play catch up rather than relishing the moment of the now. "Now" moments are so fleeting. They flash before us like those squiggly lines on a screen. Present moments go as quickly as they come but it is important to discover them and rest in them as often as we can. Though gone in a flash, these now moments of encounter with God teach powerful lessons and offer a grounding in truth that can be found nowhere else. It's the grace of Advent to become watchful and attentive because we are never sure when God will surprise us.

God loves surprises and love thrives on them! God's now moments of surprises come as tender instants of intimate connection where I find profound peace, experience joy, and rest in love. These are Advent times reflective of the now moments when Christ first was born, when God surprises us during every time we care to watch and when the great surprise of Christ's second coming dawns upon us all. But, to discover the grandeur and experience the awe of these now times, we have to be ready. We have to want to be there. We have to believe. And, we have to have the desire to soak in as much as we can in the time we have before us.

Catholic Q and A

J.P. Alegria

Q: In defining the word, religion, a dictionary may vaguely and dismissively characterize it as the practice of a set of beliefs, but how does the Catholic Church present and fully live out its own definition of religion?

A: The catechism starts with the premise that the first Commandment summons us to believe in God, to hope in him, and to love him above all else. It teaches about "authentic" worship and faith, individually and as social beings.

Pope Francis wrote that whether as part of a discussion of ecumenical matters or fundamentalism, or universality, or evangelization, that religion, "should not build walls." "Religion should be a "channel of brotherhood."

In scripture, we find in Hebrews 11 that religion is about faith and works, citing many examples such as: *"By faith, Abraham offered up Isaac."*

That "authenticity of religion" referenced in the catechism is a hallmark of the preaching of our own patron, St.James. His words are memorialized on the outside north wall of our Church: *"Be Doers of the Word."*

James, one of the "Sons of Thunder," wrote about religion with his customary boldness: *"Faith by itself; if it has no works, is dead."*

Scripture and the catechism encourage works of religion that please God: caring for the aged, the poor, the widow, the sick, and the prisoner; seeing the face of Jesus in their faces.

The multifaceted principles and practices of our religion are wonderfully clarified in Hebrews 13: "Do not neglect to do good."

Advent begins Sunday

Advent comes from the Latin word meaning "coming." Jesus is coming, and Advent is intended to be a season of preparation for His arrival. While we typically regard Advent as a joyous season, it is also intended to be a period of preparation, much like Lent. Prayer, penance and fasting are appropriate during this season.

Advent is not as strict as Lent, and there are no rules for fasting, but it is meant to be a period of self-preparation. The purple color associated with Advent is also the color of penance. The faithful should fast during the first two weeks in particular and receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

The color of the Third Sunday of Advent is rose. This color symbolizes joy and represents the happiness we will experience when Jesus comes again. The Third Sunday is a day of anticipatory celebration. It is formerly called "Gaudete" Sunday; gaudete means "rejoice" in Latin.

Finally, Sundays during Advent, just as during Lent, should not be given to fasting, but instead to celebration because we celebrate the resurrection of Our Lord every Sunday.


