

Pastor's Corner

Parish Life Thrives in New Ways

With our 'Safer at Home' lives that we have lived these past 2 months, with so many businesses closed and our activities curtailed, it may seem that the world has almost stopped—except for the daily pandemic reports. But life here has continued to find new ways to flourish.

Our St. James School buildings sit empty most of the time, but the education of our children continues daily as our teachers and students have gone on-line for all their classes. The same is true at our Preschool. Our teachers prepare kits for the children each week and then parents and children go on-line as our teachers guide them through the lessons and projects they need to grow mentally and spiritually in these critical years.

While 1st Communions and Confirmation are postponed, our younger children work on-line with their teachers to continue to learn the basics of God's love and our faith in Christ as our Savior preparing for 1st Communion. Our high school Confirmation students also meet on-line with our youth leaders to stay balanced in their lives and understand more fully the gift of the Holy Spirit that will inspire them to use well the gifts God has blessed them with. The same is true for our adults preparing for Confirmation, meeting on-line with our team.

Easter Baptisms are also postponed, but both our adult and youth catechumens are on-line with their mentors continuing the journey of nurturing their faith and preparing to live the Gospel. Our Tuesday night Bible Study meets online now as well and they are beginning new sessions this week.

The Pastoral Council and Finance Council actually met early on, but continue with on-line meetings as will the Liturgy Committee as we get word of being able to open the church and then gather again for Mass.

Our Feed the Needy ministry to feed the homeless in our community continues 3 times a week, but with some modifications to help ensure the safety of our volunteers and those who come to us for lunch. Our St. Vincent de Paul outreach also continues to care for special needs of families in the community.

We have a team of staff and volunteers to reach out to many of our parishioners by phone to check in and make sure you are OK. (Many parishioners who have moved from land lines to cell phones have not updated our records, but we are calling as many as we can.) Consider writing your cell number on your Sunday envelope, if mailing in, or send an e-mail to the office with your current contact information.

So, has the parish shut down? Nope. It's thriving as we adapt to help us all stay safe and healthy. Thank you for being part of this wonderful community. There are new

challenges and opportunities ahead for each of us, and with generous hearts God will continue to lead and inspire us.

Church Support Drops by 50%

At our recent Priest Council Meeting with Archbishop Gomez, he asked us how the pandemic is affecting the parishes.

All 20 pastors at the meeting, including me, reported that their Sunday Offertory collection was at 50% to 60% of normal, and all of them were becoming very worried about how their parish would survive financially through the pandemic and what would happen to the parish staff if they needed to be laid off.

At St. James we are trying our utmost to reduce our expenditures, which will enable us to make it financially to the end of June, but then the parish will have depleted all its funds.

(The monies collected for Our Faith. Our Future. are held in a Restricted Account and cannot be used for parish operating expenses.)

The parish staff is continuing to call parishioners to see how you are doing and are continuing to provide spiritual enrichment through daily Masses and messages posted on our website: **SaintJames.church**.

Thank you for the many calls of appreciation that we can still be together as a parish family as best we can with this outreach.

Sixth Sunday of Easter

We hope for many things: passing an exam, finding our true love, securing sustainable work, or surviving an illness. We often seek to have God be a part of what we hope for and desire, almost trying to convince Him that our agenda is what is ultimately important. While our particular hopes may appear to be what needs to be achieved in order for us to be happy, they really are not. Our lesser, more personal hopes can distract us from true hope.

When God became a human being, a powerful message was sent: all that is authentically human is found in the divine. As the human Jesus lived and died in order to show us that he truly is the universal Christ, we have to keep our sight focused on our eternal truth and destiny and who we truly are. We have to be careful when we allow our earthly concerns to distract us. True hope is found when we place our trust in Christ's promises and don't rely on our own strength. True hope focuses on striving toward the fulfillment of God's promises and not simply on achieving what we think we need in this life. Hope always travels with two friends faith and love. In this trio of virtues, we find the very presence of God born in every human being. These are God's greatest gifts, and they lead us to the fullness of His presence.

As with faith and love, we cannot see hope with just our human eyes. We don't carry this virtue within us to use solely for our own personal agenda. Hope is not something that simply comes with the human package. As with faith and love, hope is a gift that is given to us to draw us closer to our eternal truth. Faith, hope, and love are signs that there is something far greater going on in us and something greater to persevere in obtaining. The true divine gift of hope is what will endure any hardship we encounter, especially those that will come from authentically living the Gospel. With all that is happening in our lives, in our church, and in our world, what is the reason for our hope? Ask God for the fortitude to see His eternal gift as the reason we get up in the morning and do the things we do. ©LPi

How to make a Spiritual Communion when no public Mass is available

For various reasons we may be prevented from receiving the Eucharist at Mass. At these times the Church calls us to make an act of "spiritual communion," where we unite ourselves to God through prayer. It is a beautiful way to express to God our desire to be united with him when we are unable to complete that union in the reception of Holy Communion.

As Public Masses are banned throughout the country, literally thousands of Masses are celebrated each day and, in addition to watching them on television or computer screens, the faithful can receive "spiritual Communion."

Pope Francis, after reciting a live-streamed Angelus prayer March 15, told people, "United to Christ we are never alone, but instead form one body, of which He is the head. It is a union that is nourished with prayer and also with spiritual communion in the Eucharist, a practice that is recommended when it isn't possible to receive the sacrament."

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

Catholics are encouraged to continue to pray at home with their families and join to the sacrifice of the Mass by making an act of spiritual communion. We are also encouraged to participate in the Holy Mass via the Internet or television. The Archdiocese will provide a livestream of non-public Masses celebrated by the priests from the Cathedral of Our Lady of Angels daily.

St. Jean-Marie Vianney said, "If we are deprived of Sacramental Communion, let us replace it, as far as we can, by spiritual communion, which we can make every moment; for we ought to have always a burning desire to receive the good God".

St. Thomas Aquinas described Spiritual Communion as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him."

St. Teresa of Jesus wrote, "When you do not receive communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual communion, which is a most beneficial practice, by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you."
