Pastor's Letter

What a difference it was last Sunday with the lifting of the facemask requirement. To see so many of your faces for the first time in 2 years and to see your smiles has been a great joy. I think we have all benefitted from being able to see each other again. Keep the smiles on.

After several months on back order the new heater for

the church was installed this week in the basement of the church. It replaces the original heater from 1960. At the onset of winter this year when we had the old heater serviced, the technician not only refused to turn it on he wouldn't even light the pilot light as it was in such dangerous shape.

For the past several years we have relied on a smaller heater on the parking lot side of the church but it is not big enough to make a significant difference for the size of church we have. With our springtime change to daylight



saving time this weekend we won't need the heater much until next winter, but it is good to finally have it replaced.

We have struggled with our newer LED spotlights flashing in the church for several years now and have tried almost everything to remedy the Bluetooth glitch that has been such a distraction. A couple weeks ago we moved the transmitter off the floor and onto a stand—and there hasn't been a single flash since. The altar has been blocking the signal...

St. Joseph is another issue. For 10 years now we have hoisted electricians up to the ceiling to try to fix the lights on him and within a week the light is always out—but sometimes not—for a week. Last fall we moved a spotlight from another location to put on Joseph, and again within 2 weeks the light stopped working. It is not easy to put scaffolding up to the ceiling of the church—or to climb the scaffolding up to the ceiling---but we are determined to get him back in the light. Could it be that just as in the scriptures Joseph is always in the back-ground and stays out of spotlight? Hmmmm

As we continue through Lent we pray that you will find strength and hope in the gift of God's love for you and the graces He gives us each day to be a positive influence on our world. Please see our article on Emergency Relief to the Ukraine as we continue to pray for an end to the invasion.

Why Go to Confession

Jesus entered this world to forgive sins. Recall the words of our Lord: "God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him may not die but may have eternal life." (Jn 3:16) During His public ministry, Jesus preached about the forgiveness of sins: remember the parables of the Prodigal Son (Lk 15:11ff) or the Lost Sheep (Lk 15:1ff), and His teaching that "There will likewise be more joy in heaven over one repentant sinner than over 96 righteous people who have no need to repent." (Lk 15:7) Jesus Himself forgave sins: remember the story of the woman caught in adultery (Jn 8:1ff) or the woman who washed His feet with her tears. (Lk 7:36ff) He also taught us to pray for forgiveness in the "Our Father:" "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." His mission of reconciliation would climax in His passion, death and resurrection: Jesus suffered, died and rose to free us from sin and death.

However, Jesus never trivialized sin or rationalized it. No, for Jesus, sin is sin, a violation of love against God and neighbor. However, in His divine mercy, Jesus called the sinner to realize the sin, to repent of it, and to be reconciled with God and neighbor.

Jesus wanted this ministry of reconciliation to continue. On the first Easter Sunday evening, Jesus appeared to His Apostles, "breathed on them," and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive men's sins, they are forgiven them; if you hold them bound, they are held bound." (Jn 20:21-23) Only twice in Sacred Scripture do we find God breathing into human beings. First, in the Genesis account of creation, God breathes the life of a soul into the man He has created. (Gen 2:7) Now, Jesus, the Son, breathes His life into His Apostles His priests, so that through them He will "breathe" life into the souls of contrite sinners. In this scene, Christ instituted the sacrament of penance and made His Apostles the ministers of it.

At the ascension, Jesus again charged His Apostles with this ministry: "Thus it is written that the Messiah must suffer and rise from the dead on the third day. In His name penance for the remission of sins is to be preached to all the nations, beginning at Jerusalem. You are witnesses of this." (Lk 24:46ff) Clearly, Jesus came to forgive sins, He wanted that reconciliation to continue and He gave the Church a sacrament through which priests would continue to act as the ministers of this reconciliation. Dying to Ourselves

Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit. Whoever loves his life, loses it, and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be. The Father will honor whoever serves me.

—John 12:24-26

Every Lent, a reflection on the power of the cross can bring a person to tears. To endure such pain and anguish in order to bring new life to a fallen world is an unfathomable event in salvation history. With blood and tears filling His eyes, Jesus cries out, "Why have you forsaken me?" Make no mistake; the incarnation rests broken on an executioner's wooden device of torture


made from hate and ridicule. Yet out of this experience.

all things are made new.

Jesus was that grain of wheat that fell to the ground and died, but an endless supply of fruit has been produced. When Jesus spoke about the time when He would be glorified, He tried to explain how this process of new life works. And old life must end for a new one to begin. His dying and rising took place exactly for the purpose of providing us a way of dying and rising in Him.

Stewardship calls for us to die to ourselves and live new lives in Jesus Christ. Like grains of wheat that fall to the ground, we can now produce much fruit. If we do not die to ourselves, we remain unchanged and unable to share in His abundance of grace.

Lent is a time to make sure the old self is gone. Find time to go to the sacrament of penance. Take part in the extra devotions in our parish, such as the Stations of the Cross or Eucharistic Adoration. Spend more personal time in prayer. Then, when Easter comes, the fruit that has been and will be produced can be offered to God. Your gifts will be received with great joy and they will be



multiplied. For we have died and risen with Jesus Christ, so that we shall not die again. Adapted from *Everyday Stewardship*, Reflections For The Journey by Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

Gospel Meditation

There is so much wisdom in the first commandment.

The daily demands of life, current political ideologies and dynamics, social expectations, corporate philosophies, and even technology can easily become lesser gods. We can find ourselves beholden to and held captive by these secular constructs and systems. Even for those who profess a faith in the one true God, these lesser, attractive but false gods are a temptation. Being overly preoccupied and even obsessed with the state of our present lives, we lose sight of our real destiny and purpose.

Jesus showed his disciples a glimpse of this destiny when he was transfigured before their eyes. In fact, Peter was so caught up in the brilliance, awe, and sacredness of these fleeting moments that he wanted to extend them as long as possible. Wonderful things happen when we leave our illusions and discover something that is true. This is why creating some sacred space in our lives for reflection, prayer, renewal, refreshment, centering ourselves, and disconnecting from the noise is so important. It shows us how false and shallow our lives can be and what is really of importance. Do you create some kind of sacred space in your life? Lent is a perfect time to do so.

St. Irenaeus, one of the early fathers and martyrs of the Catholic Church, said that,

"he who was the Son of God became the Son of Man that man ... might become the son of God."

We mistakenly believe that life is all about us. It's not.

Ours is a journey of transformation in which we become more and more one with the mind of Christ and Christ himself. St. Augustine saw this same transformation occurring when the Eucharist is received. In receiving the Eucharist, we become what we eat, the Body of Christ. Honestly acknowledging false gods that we cling to can open the door for God to show us the wholeness and holiness to which we are called.

Take time to discover the sacred. When we do, we will want to stay there for a while. Then, when we return to our personal affairs, we will see more clearly. ©LPi

This Week's Topic: "Our Lenten Journey"

In the "season of conversion" that is Lent, a song by Bernadette Farrell could be a musical template of faith.

Q: How does this song, "Christ, Be Our Light" reflect the teachings of the Church in this season of Lent?

A: Song Lyrics:

"Longing for peace, our world is troubled, longing for hope, many despair. Your word alone has power to save us. Make us your living voice."

Reflection: That living voice is highlighted in the words of Pope Francis:

"May every family use well this time of lent, and grow in whatever, (by fasting and almsgiving), nourishes the soul, along with a greater commitment to prayer; to be spiritually immersed in God."

The Holy Father also referred to the value of a penitential attitude among the faithful, as outlined in the *Catechism*.

Song Lyrics:

"Longing for light, we wait in darkness, longing for truth, we turn to you, Make us your own, your holy people, light for the world to see."

Reflection: Pope John Paul II, speaking on the second Sunday of Lent in 2004, touched on the saving grace of prayer and the power of conversion:

"The interior light that transfigures the human person comes from this trusting abandonment to God, (in prayer), making the person a witness of the resurrection."

Song Lyrics:

"This is the night of new beginnings. This is the night when heaven meets earth. This is the night, filled with God's glory, promise of our new birth."

Reflection: Again, within a compilation of Pope St. John Paul II "Words to Live By" the Pontiff spoke in an Angelus Address on the first Sunday of Lent, 2004, referencing a Lenten path of conversion; a path of personal and communal renaissance. He spoke of providential spiritual growth, offering assurances:

"Jesus' victory over the evil one assures us that we will not succumb at the moment of trial, (temptation?), as long as we remain united to the Lord. In this perspective, Lent invites us to make a special commitment to the process of spiritual growth."

Finally, our song in melodic Refrain:

"Christ be our light! Shine in our hearts, Shine through the darkness, Christ be our light! Shine in your church gathered

today."

Helping Children Grow in Faith

'Train the young in the way they should go; even when old, they will not swerve from it' Proverbs 22:6


