Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends and Families of St. James.

We want to welcome all of our guests this weekend. Easter always brings visitors from far and wide and we want to know that we are glad that you are with us. If you are returning "home" welcome back! If you are with us for the first time come back again. You are always welcome to pray with us and we are a better community due to your presence!

The story of Holy Week is not just a story about Jesus, it is a story about us, and God's great love for us. It is about the journey of our lives. So many of us are struggling and need reassurance that there is hope. All was lost on Good Friday: the savior was crucified and his followers ran away. But even on the darkest day in history, hope broke through and walked away from an empty tomb. So, there's hope for all of us.

The world tells me to take care of "me" and focus on "my" needs. My strength. My feelings. My pleasure. My thoughts. My value. My purpose. When I focus on myself, life quickly spins out of control. My thoughts, my wisdom, my strength. These cannot lie at the center.

Only Jesus can be our center.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum, those holiest days of the year, are filled with rich symbols and rituals — from the washing of feet on Holy Thursday, to the adoration of the Holy Cross on Good Friday, to the Easter Fire dispelling the darkness and the baptism of new Christians at the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. These rituals are at the core of who we are: a people of service, faithful to the example and command of Jesus, who embrace the Cross, which is our hope, so that we might share in the newness of life that is ours in the risen Christ.

Whether you are here every Sunday, or haven't been in the church for a long time, Easter is about God's tremendous love for you and his desire to transform and inspire you with a new life and a new hope. Join us this Easter and simply open your heart that Christ's abundant love for you might become the healing grace and hope you seek.

The Easter Homily of St. John Chrysostom

If any man be devout and loveth God,

Let him enjoy this fair and radiant triumphal feast! If any man be a wise servant,

Let him rejoicing enter into the joy of his Lord.

If any have laboured long in fasting,

Let him how receive his recompense.

If any have wrought from the first hour,

Let him today receive his just reward.

If any have come at the third hour.

Let him with thankfulness keep the feast.

If any have arrived at the sixth hour,

Let him have no misgivings;

Because he shall in nowise be deprived therefore.

If any have delayed until the ninth hour,

Let him draw near, fearing nothing.

And if any have tarried even until the eleventh hour.

Let him, also, be not alarmed at his tardiness.

For the Lord, who is jealous of his honour,

Will accept the last even as the first.

He giveth rest unto him who cometh at the eleventh hour, Even as unto him who hath wrought from the first hour.

And He showeth mercy upon the last,

And careth for the first:

And to the one He giveth.

And upon the other He bestoweth gifts.

And He both accepteth the deeds.

And welcometh the intention,

And honoureth the acts and praises the offering.

Wherefore, enter ye all into the joy of your Lord; Receive your reward.

Both the first, and likewise the second.

You rich and poor together, hold high festival!

You sober and you heedless, honour the day!

Rejoice today, both you who have fasted

And you who have disregarded the fast.

The table is full-laden; feast ye all sumptuously.

The calf is fatted; let no one go hungry away.

Enjoy ye all the feast of faith:

Receive ye all the riches of loving-kindness.

Let no one bewail his poverty,

For the universal Kingdom has been revealed.

Let no one weep for his iniquities,

For pardon has shown forth from the grave.

Let no one fear death,

For the Saviour's death has set us free.

By descending into Hell, He made Hell captive.

He embittered it when it tasted of His flesh.

Divine Mercy Sunday is April 7th

In a series of revelations to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s, our Lord called for a special feast day to be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter. Today, we know that feast as Divine Mercy Sunday, named by Pope St. John Paul II at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30, 2000.

The Lord expressed His will with regard to this feast in His very first revelation to St. Faustina.

The most comprehensive revelation can be found in her *Diary* entry 699:

"My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and a shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day are opened all the divine floodgates through which graces flow. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me

Everything that exists has come from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My mercy."

To fittingly observe the Feast of Mercy, we should:

- Celebrate the Feast on the Sunday after Easter.
- 2. Sincerely repent of all our sins.
- 3. Place our complete trust in Jesus.
- 4. Go to Confession, preferably before that Sunday.
- 5. Receive Holy Communion on the day of the Feast.
- 6. Venerate* the Image of The Divine Mercy.

Be merciful to others, through our actions, words, and prayers on their behalf.

*To venerate a sacred image or statue simply means to perform some act or make some gesture of deep religious respect toward it because of the person whom it represents — in this case, our Most Merciful Savior.

Topic: Roll Away the Stone

Easter!

The St. James Choir sings out with joy:

"This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad,"

That fulfilling exclamatory song of proclamation is based on Psalm 118, and, as that same Psalm says:

"...it is wonderful in our eyes."

But...

Q: Is that Easter day of joy but one day, or 8 days (an octave), or is the Easter celebration 50 days in length?

A: Catholic Culture.org and Trinity Communications delineates that:

"With the whole Church we rejoice at the resurrection of Christ. The Church celebrates the Easter season or Eastertide."

St. Athanasius said

"the fifty days from the Sunday of the Resurrection to Pentecost Sunday are celebrated in joy and exultation... indeed as one great Sunday, but the first eight days or octave specifically celebrate the solemnity of Easter every day. Easter and Christmas are the highest ranked feasts of the liturgical calendar."

"Each day of the Octave the liturgy dwells on the mysteries of the resurrection of Christ and our own resurrection through the sacrament of Baptism.

The word "Easter" comes from the Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the rising Christ who is the true light of the world."

In the glow of that light, The Saint John Paul II Institute at the University of St. Thomas writes:

"O God, who gladden us year by year with the solemnity of the Lord's Resurrection, graciously grant, that, by celebrating these present festivities, we may merit through them to reach eternal joys."

The Catechism states:

"The mystery of Christ's resurrection is a real event...the Good News fulfilled...the crowning truth of our faith in Christ...a faith believed and lived..."

Let us rejoice and be glad!

Gospel Meditation— Father John Muir

Outside Chicago, there is a small cemetery in the woods behind Mundelein Seminary, where I was a student. One night I was exploring it. I looked up and was shocked to see an imposing seventeen-foot angel towering over me and preparing to blow a trumpet. Adrenaline rushed through me. I gasped and uttered, "Oh my God!" Quickly I realized it was in fact a massive bronze statue. I tried to calm myself down. But it still freaked me out.

As we begin to celebrate Easter today, this image might seem a bit unnerving. But please recall that for the first disciples on the morning of the resurrection, it was precisely that. It wasn't joyful at first, it was terrifying. It wasn't peaceful, it was unsettling. In that Jerusalem cemetery, something otherworldly had happened. Angels announced that he was no longer dead, but alive. They had blown their trumpets, so to speak, and Jesus had risen. Soon the disciples' shock in that dark cemetery would turn into joy.

We all have our own places of the dead, too, don't we? Deceased loved ones. Our tired patterns of blame. Relationships stuck in resentment. Indifference to the poor. Lost dreams. Despair about our future. Fear of sickness and death. These are our "cemeteries" where we don't expect much to happen. Today we enter — if we dare — those places with the disciples. See the mighty angel standing there, trumpet ready to blare!
